

Being Salt and Light in a Time Like This



"You shall not wrong or oppress a resident alien, for you were aliens in the land of Egypt." Exodus 22:21 "... I was a stranger and you welcomed me..." Matthew 25:35

y heart has been broken these last few days as I witness the chaos, confusion, hardship, fear, and suffering brought about by the new president's Executive Order to ban entry to the U.S. of all citizens of certain Muslim countries, put a hold on admitting all refugees for 120 days, and an indefinite hold on entry by refugees from Syria. Of course our government has the right and the duty to screen those entering our country to keep out those who pose a danger.

I witnessed those rigorous screening processes firsthand during my trip to Thailand's refugee camps some years ago. But this order is hasty, careless, and causing much more pain and disruption than reasonable caution requires. It also blatantly discriminates against Muslims including those who are already legal residents of the U.S.

The faces that have come to my mind over these last few days are of the refugees from all over the world who became beloved sisters and brothers in Christ during our 20 year ministry at North Shore. And I also picture our ABCMC pastors, cherished colleagues, who were not born in the U.S. and the members of their congregations who are immigrants and refugees from Mexico, the Caribbean, Central and South America, India, and Burma. So much of our ministry as churches and as a Region is a ministry of welcoming the stranger as we would welcome Christ.

Sunday evening, at our Ministers Council Fellowship dinner, those gathered spoke of anguish and struggle over this and many other policies and actions of the new administration that they viewed as harmful to vulnerable sisters and brothers. "What can we do?" "How do we respond?" "How can I effectively resist?" I listened to this conversation well aware that our pastors and churches already face many burdens and are fully engaged in many important ministries. And yet this is not an ordinary moment. Anxious paralysis or complacency will not fulfill our calling from God. What will fulfill God's call upon us is greater clarity and renewed commitment to each one's core vocation. A neighbor who is a physician said on the day following the election: "I will go to work this morning and be the very best doctor I can be. I will stand for decency, do what is right, and side with justice in and through my daily work."

That is an example for all our churches, pastors, and lay people to follow. Look again. How is your congregation already light and salt in your community? All the gospel work you are already doing surely is making a difference in spreading the mercy and love and hope of Christ's reign. Are there ways that work can be refocused or expanded to

respond to the current threats to vulnerable people? Some pastors may find new gifts and callings within them. Some will see greater need for the gifts and skills they are already using. Some of our churches may write letters to government officials for the first time. Others may reach out to a nearby mosque. Still others may continue with renewed determination to care for the homeless or imprisoned or hungry or to educate children.

When our hearts are breaking over threats to the welfare of the needy and the strangers among us, let us not become paralyzed by torrents of bad news. And "let us not grow weary in doing what is right." Rather, let us shine with the light of Christ in all we do.


